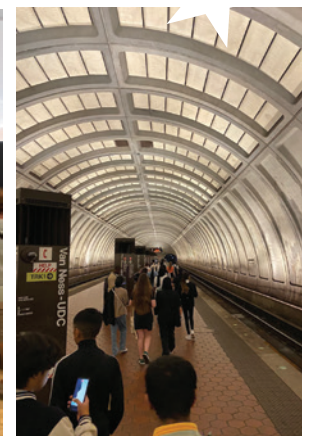

MATHS PROBLEM OF THE WEEK

Did you manage to solve the maths problem this week?

In a pirate's trunk there are 5 chests. In each chest there are 4 boxes and in each box there are 10 gold coins. The trunk, the chests and the boxes are all locked. Blind Pew unlocks 9 locks and takes all the coins in all the boxes he unlocks.
 What is the smallest number of gold coins he could take?

ANSWER: 30
 To obtain the smallest number of gold coins, the least possible number of boxes must be opened. Therefore, Blind Pew must open the trunk and all five chests, leaving only three boxes to be opened. Hence the smallest number of gold coins he could take is $3 \times 10 = 30$.
